

# WEEK 4 CLASSICS TIMELESS NOV. 20TH

Joe Carmean started catching when he was 6 and he's still catching now at 66. The Hatboro, Pa., resident loves catching and talking about catchers and catching.

"It's the guarterback of baseball," Carmean said.

Carmean, who is with the Philadelphia Brewers this week, studies the position's nuances such as framing pitches. He said his subtle use of framing helps his pitchers.

"I get a lot of strikes a lot of other pitchers don't get," Carmean said.

One of his catching highlights came in the Upper Moreland Little League in Willow Grove, Pa., when he caught a very talented kid a couple of years ahead of him in the league.

That was Craig Robinson, who went on to play 6 years in the majors in the 1970s and was the Atlanta Braves starting shortstop in 1974.

"He threw BBs," Carmean said. "I had to have two sponges."
In the more than half a century since he started catching and on through American Legion baseball and fast pitch softball,
Carmean knows part of a catcher's job is counseling pitchers.
He knows how to call pitches and spot tiny flaws in a pitcher's delivery. "It's my job to work with pitchers," Carmean said.
That sometimes compels him to offer advice. "I say I want you to

not take your eyes off the target," he said.

Although Carmean said he also plays the infield and outfield, he's a catcher. "I identify as a catcher," he said.

His favorite childhood player wasn't one of the big stars of the 1950s or 1960s, say Willie Mays or Mickey Mantle or Richie Ashburn of his hometown team Phillies.

"Growing up my hero was Stan Lopata," Carmean said.

Lopata was a catcher with the Phillies from 1948 to 1958. In only 2 of those seasons, though, did he play more than 100 games. He was a solid dependable backup.

Carmean has come a long way from the Upper Moreland Little League. He said he now has a pacemaker but that won't keep him from catching.

"If I die on a baseball field that's the way to go," he said.

MVP and team award certificates should be redeemed at the Roy Hobbs World Series Headquarters at the Player Development Complex on Fridays or Saturdays. Samples of the MVP items are on display in our Pro Shop.

The RHWS MVP award is a personalized Polo Shirt in one of four available colors. It will include the RHWS MVP logo, player's name and team and ship directly to the player in January or February unless otherwise requested. Shipping is included within the continental US.

This year there are three potential upgrades on the MVP Award choices:

First option is a Wind Shirt in navy or black. It will also include the RHWS Logo, player's name and team. Cost of the wind shirt is \$55, including shipping and applicable taxes within the continental US. Players may opt to take the wind shirt instead of the polo, making the cost upgrade \$15 inclusive.

Second option is a personalized trophy bat with the RHWS logo, player's name and team inscribed in the barrel. Cost of the bat is \$90, including shipping and applicable taxes within the continental US. Players may opt to take the bat instead of the polo, making the cost upgrade \$50, inclusive.

Third option is a belt buckle with two designs to choose from, again with the RHWS MVP logo and player's name / team. Cost of this item is \$110, including shipping and applicable taxes within the continental US. Players may opt to take the belt buckle instead of the polo, making the cost upgrade \$70, inclusive.

Lastly, Roy Hobbs has a ring option available. Examples of these rings can be found in the Pro Shop and on our website. Pricing varies, so players wishing to explore this option should contact Tom Giffen directly to discuss options and pricing. Players may opt to order a ring instead of the polo, and \$40 will be deducted from the cost.

Every team is issued an MVP certificate. Players in possession of their certificate or the manager can come to Headquarters and see Karen, Mike or Rob to get the award order taken care of. Managers appointing an additional MVP need to report to the office to name his players and pay the additional fee of \$45.

All teams and/or players may order RHWS championship rings.

The award structure for each of the Division in the Roy Hobbs World Series are outlined in the RHWS program. Rings can be reviewed in the Pro Shop at the Player Development Complex or online at royhobbs.com/worldseries/rings/ ...

#### Rich Gagliardi getting batters out

Rich Gagliardi is still on the mound, still pitching, still getting batters out.

Now, the retired industrial arts teacher from Long Island pitches for the Long Island Braves. Once, he pitched for the State University of New York at Oswego baseball team. Look up the team's 1976 roster and there'll you'll find Gagliardi, who was listed as a 5-foot-8, 160-pound senior from Valley Stream. N.Y.

Before he started for the Braves last Sunday against the Classic Thunder at the Player Development Complex, Gagliardi reminisced.

He spoke fondly of the time he pitched 7 innings of no-hit ball against Buffalo in 1976, a game that went extra innings. "We ended up winning the game," he said.

Gagliardi has no illusions he was a star pitcher in college, somebody who the scouts were clamoring to draft.

"I wasn't like the main starter," Gagliardi said. "I came in and saved the day." He certainly did in that game against Buffalo. Now that he's 62 and pitching in the Roy Hobbs World Series, his approach is a little different than it was in college.

"To have fun, not get hurt and prove to myself I can still do it," Gagliardi said.

He's certainly doing that.

His battery mate, catcher Joe Glorioso, an Army veteran who served in Desert Storm, encouraged him in the dugout. Although focused on the game, Glorioso took a moment to talk about his family, his two kids and three grandchildren. "And a beautiful wife," Glorioso said between innings. His wife's name is Kathy. But on Sunday morning, Kathy had to briefly take a backseat to Rich Gagliardi, the former industrial arts teacher.
